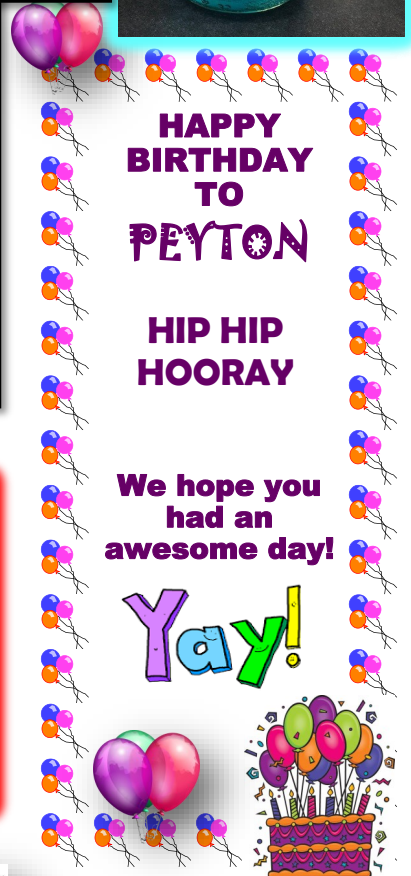
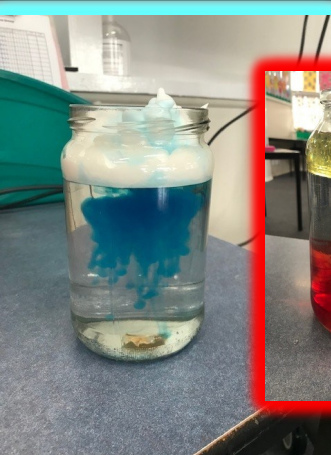
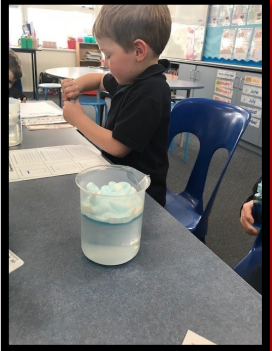

Echidna Facts

Echidnas are a native animal to Australia. They live in a burrow in the ground.

Their predators are Dingoes, Eagles and Foxes. They don't release their spines to protect themselves.

They don't have teeth; they only use their tongues to get food like termites and ants. They use their tongues and the tongues slap in back in their throat.

Echidnas are different to Hedgehogs because echidnas are mammals which means the echidnas lay eggs like the platypus. A baby echidna is called a puggle, a group of echidnas is called a parade and a group of puggles is a puggle parade.

The males become bigger in size than the females, some are 35-52cm. They dig themselves below the ground surface to survive from bushfires in the wild.

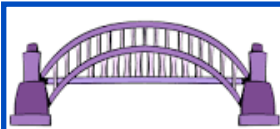
THE GREAT BARRIER REEF

SYDNEY



Sydney is famous for Sydney Harbour Bridge, Sydney Opera House, Luna Park and other places. Sydney is a city. Sydney is the capital city of New South Wales. The population is about 5.28 million people in 2023. 5.6 million tourists visited Sydney in 2023.

Opera House/Harbour Bridge

The Sydney Opera House is a multi-person place. Sydney Opera House is located on the foreshore of Sydney Harbour. The Opera House is 4.4 acres long.

Climate

The cool season stays for 2.8 months from 29th May to 22nd August, with an average daily high temperature below 19°C. The coldest month of the year in Sydney is July, with an average low of 9°C and high of 17°C.
